## **MEDICATION CHANGES FOR 2013-2014**

Greenfield-Central Community School Corporation is committed to practicing safe medication administration in the school setting. Changes were implemented this school year to enhance the safety of <u>prescription</u> medication administration in the clinics. This change has already proven effective as it enhanced the partnership between families, physicians, and school staff.

After careful consideration regarding current protocols for **over-the-counter** medications, it was

determined that changes were necessary to improve on **over the counter** medications administered by school staff. New protocols are outlined below.

#### **Grades Kindergarten-Six**

Beginning with the 2013-2014 school year, Form 5330 F1b must be completed for **over-the-counter** medications. This form must be completed <u>by both</u> <u>parent and a licensed health care provider</u>. This is intended to help monitor for potential toxicities associated with younger smaller developing bodies. **Over-the-counter** medication <u>must</u> be brought to school by a parent or an adult 18 or over who is listed as an emergency contact in PowerSchool. **Over-thecounter** medication may <u>not</u> be brought to school by K-6 students.

New medication forms will be able to be printed from the school website or a copy can be obtained from the health clinic. Thank you for partnering with us to facilitate safe medication practices in the school.

#### **TEACHER REQUESTS**

Parents certainly have an interest in their child's education and sharing in the classroom assignment is welcomed. Parents who wish to have a particular assignment must write a letter to the office of the principal requesting at least <u>two</u> choices and stating the reason for their special request. Although requests will be considered, it may not be possible to fulfill them and properly balance classrooms.

# Summer Safety Tips

- \*MAKE SURE children know their full name, address, telephone numbers and how to use the telephone.
- \*BE SURE children know what to do in case of an emergency and how to reach you by phone. Children should have a neighbor or trusted adult they may call if they're scared or there's an emergency.
- \*REVIEW the rules with your children about whose homes they may visit and discuss the boundaries of where they may and may not go in the neighborhood.
- \*MAKE SURE children know to stay away from pools, creeks, or any body of water without adult supervision.

- \*CAUTION children to keep the door locked and not to open it or talk to anyone who comes to the door when they are home alone.
- \*DON'T drop your children off at malls, movies, video arcades or parks as these are not safe places for children to be alone. Make sure a responsible adult is supervising younger children any time they are outside or away from home.
- \*TEACH your children in whose vehicle they may ride. Children should be cautioned to never approach any vehicle, occupied or not, unless accompanied by a parent or other trusted adult.
- 8. \***BE SURE** your children know their curfew and that they check in with you if they are going to be late. If children are playing outside after dark, make sure they wear reflective clothing and stay close to home.
- \*CHOOSE babysitters with care. Obtain references from family, friends, and neighbors. Many states now have registries for public access to check criminal history or sexoffender status. Observe the babysitter's interaction with your children, and ask your children how they feel about the babysitter.
- 10. \*CHECK out camp and other summer programs before enrolling your children. See if a background screening check is completed on the

individuals working with the children. Make sure there will be adult supervision of your children at all times, and make sure you are made aware of all activities and field trips offered by the camp or program.
